Serving the Underserved in our Neighborhood

Over the past 10 weeks St. Paul's community hasn't missed a meal. Quality carryout meals prepared by a chef from Miami Valley Career Technology Center utilizing extraordinary high-quality free food resources from the Life Enrichment Center have made lunch possible every Tuesday and breakfast every Saturday. Five to six volunteers who are not at risk for the virus plate the meals in our kitchen and welcome and serve coffee to the gathered community. Averaging 150 meals per day we, with partners, have distributed over 3000 meals over the past 10 weeks.

This outreach has been to neighborhood families, seniors from Huffman Place, addicts and homeless, people in recovery, and three sober living communities in east Dayton. St. Paul's team and partner agencies are on the sidewalk with masks, maintaining social distance, greeting people, providing peer support and on-site counseling, outreach for housing, and applications for ID's. Hygiene bags, emergency clothing, toilet paper and hand washing capability in a newly designed mobile hand-washing station are also part of every meal. A listening ear, prayer and/or an online weekly devotion sent to a cell phone are made available. We have developed many new relationships as continuing to care for vulnerable people from our St. Paul Community.

For now, we expect to maintain this pattern for June but are longing for the day when volunteers from our partner churches can rejoin our outreach as well as provide the hospitality of our sanctuary and wonderful dining facilities.





Every one of our newsletter articles can begin with the statement: "We are living in extraordinary times!"

We began the tax season with a new IRS program and three familiar faces: Vicki Morris in charge of appointments, Kirby Lupton and Mike Cornelius as volunteer tax preparers. The new program worked very well and then came COVID 19 in March! Kirby continued his appointments at St. Paul on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, using social distancing and extra sanitary precautions. Mike decided to work from home so he made weekly trips to St. Paul to pick and return tax packets.

As a result, this dedicated group served 181 clients by preparing their federal and state returns for free. The total federal refund for our site was \$213,002.00 and the total Ohio refund was \$38,480.00, averaging \$1,176.81 per federal return and \$212.60 per Ohio return. The St. Paul tax program serves a genuine need in our community. Our heartfelt message to the St. Paul tax crew: "**Job Well Done**". Thank you


FOOD PANTRY AND STUFF SHOPPE'S PANDEMIC RESPONSE

During this pandemic, St. Paul has remained true to its mission but it looks a little different! The thrift store, Stuff Shoppe, has been closed to the public as has the church building. During this time, all the winter clothing has been bagged up to go the St. Vincent de Paul. All three rooms of the thrift store have been thoroughly cleaned and sanitized. Our new line of spring and summer fashions have been stocked. All this hard work was completed by super volunteers Judy Haines, Mary Kahn, Judy Kreutzer, Mike Kreutzer, Diane Turner and Linda Schmidt while the thrift store and the church have been closed. Plans are being made to open the store with masks being worn and a small number of people permitted in for a specified time period. Because we are not moving the usual volume of clothing, we will not be able to accept donations until August.

The food pantry has also taken on a new routine. We are still open on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday for shorter hours: 10am – 1pm. The clients wait outside while their order is filled. Until further notice we cannot offer the choice pantry where customers select their own groceries. We need and are accepting all food items for the pantry during our reduced office hours of 9am – 1pm weekdays. Plans are being made to go into another phase of service on June 1st. Customers will be allowed in 1 person at a time but their food will still be bagged up for them. Staff member, Cora Crain, has been working hard to keep this service going with the help of volunteers Dan Vanoli and Mike Kreutzer. We are truly grateful for all the wonderful donations. We give a special thank you to Christ UMC and Chris Wright who organized a drive by food collection in their parking lot every Thursday at a certain time.
