Our Spiritual Path Can be a Third Way

St. Paul United Methodist Church is a gathering of very, very diverse folks who first are welcomed and treated like they belong; with excellent teaching through sermons, Bible studies and informal conversation, the group journeys on a path to “believe” deeper and deeper; and we reach out here or go out to bless and be blessed. We don’t try to agree on everything because we are diverse. However, God is leading us collectively to pay attention to God’s wisdom, to open our hearts to understanding and to open our minds to insight. Following the Word, Jesus, who told his disciples that He is the Truth, puts us with the poor and broken and those who discover humility. From this stance, we argue less.



Presently we have been reading and in conversation about this path as followed by Saint Francis of Assisi through an articulation in a book, *Eagar to Love*, by Father Richard Rohr. Like Francis and his brothers and sisters, we at St. Paul are training through seeking to imitate Jesus, the person, not just to worship Him. God is leading this little flock and our many friends who come to be in ministry with us to humbly be the Body of Christ. Currently we are invited to align with the practical and functional Christianity found in the book of James.

We are in the midst of profound human suffering. We must pay attention to our daily practices — are they compatible with the teachings of Jesus? We must form humble relationships — are they compatible with the actions of Jesus? We must strive for a compassionate way of life — are these consistent with Jesus’ model while He was with us on earth?

The United Methodist Church is in a season of change. As human beings, we tend to “live” ourselves into the new way of thinking more than “think” into new ways of living. Everything is not black and white. There does not always have to be a singular right or wrong way. Could it be that the Institutional Church has been arguing and asking the wrong questions, blaming and/or reacting to one other? Is there a Third Way? Can we seek to live prophetically and humbly guide others through words and actions into this deeper way? Our third way is to intentionally emphasize *doing*, *including* and *loving*. This is different than trying to follow dualistic rules. Instead of worrying and arguing about obeying/disobeying rules of the church, we are focusing on obedience to the essence of the Gospel itself, knowing and following Jesus who is the Way.

What have we been learning about this Third Way? It is a way of responding, without being antagonistic, by introducing alternatives to reframe an issue and creating something new, as the Holy Spirit always does. This Third Way of compassionate creativity is much more positive than getting trapped into either fight or flight. What we emphasize and how we stress it determine what we pay attention to and what we allow ourselves to ignore. We are human and all limited but God’s Love is eternal. It seems that being resourced by God’s Love offers us an abundance to be shared. Our highest goal is to love with God’s love.

I invite you to join discussion with some folks in the St. Paul community if any of these ideas have been stirring in you as well.

Hooray! St. Paul reached its goal of 200 tax clients in the 2016 tax season! The five tax counselors served 216 clients for a total of 428 returns [federal and state]. Of the 216 clients, 88 were seniors 60+ years. One hundred seventy nine clients received a total of \$260,277 in refunds for an average of \$1,454.

Ladies Day Out — A New Women's Ministry

We will be adding a new ministry this fall through a partnership with the East Dayton Senior Collaborative. Ladies Day Out is intended to assist the underserved population of senior women at St. Paul UMC, the residential senior facility across the street from the church, along with many women in the community, by providing a free community lunch and programming for women 55+ on Thursdays from 11 a.m.–1 p.m. starting September 8. Programs offered will vary in topics and activities from educational, health and wellness, and recreational.

Why this ministry? By looking at our holy currencies, especially the currencies of wellness and truth, we discovered a serious need for the senior women population of our community. As women grow older, their likelihood of living alone increases. While living alone does not inevitably lead to social isolation, it certainly is a predisposing factor. Social contacts decrease as women age for a variety of reasons including retirement, death of friends and family, or lack of mobility. Regardless of the causes of senior isolation, the consequences can be alarming and even harmful. Even perceived social isolation — the feeling you are lonely — is a struggle for many older women. Offering a program that provides an opportunity to come together in a community experience can go a long way to lessen the feeling of isolation for senior women thus creating a healthier, happier life for those we serve.

During April 2016, with your support, St. Paul UMC

- served 1177 delicious hot meals at Tuesday lunch and Saturday breakfast;
